Implied conditional. In English, sometimes we use the idea of 'if' without using an 'if' clause. This is called an implied conditional. It is when the 'if clause' is implied and not stated. Conditional verbs are used in the result clause. Conditional verbs are often used after 'otherwise'.

As a refresher, an unreal conditional sentence expresses events that are hypothetical or improbable. Typically, an unreal conditional sentence begins with an if clause containing the past tense or past perfect tense of a verb followed by a conditional clause containing a modal verb such as "would." Consider the following sentences:

SO/AS LONG AS, PROVIDING/PROVIDED (THAT) So/As long as and providing/provided (that) can be used instead of if to express a condition. Note that providing/provided (that) is a bit formal: You can stay here as long as you keep quiet. Provided/Providing (that) the bills are paid, tenants will not be evicted.

Conditional - EF

We now look at another type of conditional sentence without the 'if' word in its subordinate clause. In conditional sentences without the word 'if' we use words such as 'as long as,' 'unless,' 'providing,' 'provided that,' 'should,' 'or' and 'otherwise.'
